June 5 (10:15am and 7pm):

Honesty and Lying

At first glance this seems like a simple message: just tell the truth. But the topic of "telling the truth" is actually complex and subtle. Research studies suggest that most of us "stretch the truth" more than once during a given day. When politicians give us their "spin" on an issue, often the question of "who is telling the truth?" confronts us. We will explore truth, honesty, and why and when we tell lies.

June 12 (1015am service)

Rainbow Sunday

This is a joyous celebration of being a "Welcoming Congregation" for everyone whatever their sexual orientation. You are invited to wear colored clothing and be part of our "Rainbow Photo" on the steps of the church after the service. The service will include a lot of lively hymn singing and members sharing their inspiring stories of coming out and affirming their human dignity and sacredness. Yet, there is still much more work to be done to end homophobia and we will recommit ourselves to that struggle.

June 12 (7pm service):

Celebrating Small Group Worship

This will be our final Sunday evening service. There will be no evening services through the summer months. The evening services will begin again in mid September. This final Sunday evening service will explore the role of small group worship in our lives, not just at church, but at home or any other setting – such as saying grace, meditating together, blessing a garden, etc. etc. etc. The possibilities are as wide as our imaginations!

June 19 (10:15am):

Blessing Our Journeys

This will be an intergenerational service and the concluding Sunday of the 2010-2011 church school year (child care will be provided throughout the summer). We will celebrate being a community of all ages. Our theme for the service will be "Blessing Our Journeys" which will include our individual journeys, our family journeys, and our churches journey.

June 26 (10:15 service)

Henry David Thoreau: Simplify!

Thoreau is one of New England's great figures. His year on Walden Pond (immortalized in his classic book "Walden") has inspired generations of people around the world. What was his life really like? What was his message? What challenge does he give us today? Can we claim his as a Unitarian ancestor? Even though he died relatively young, he died peacefully. How did he achieve that?

Giving Thanks

It is with great pleasure that I reflect on the dedicated service of a member of our congregation. Christine Cavallaro knows the Religious Education program inside and out. She has taught in the Sunday morning program. She's taught Our Whole Lives to our 7th and 8th graders. She piloted Our Whole Lives for our 5, 6 and 7 year olds. As a member of the RE Committee, she greeted new families on Sunday morning and made sure that children found their way to their classrooms. She helped run seasonal celebrations. She participated in many thoughtful discussions about the core mission and goals of the RE program. When the RE Committee started dividing up portfolios, she took on the budget and administration portfolios. She rejuvenated the staff evaluation process and developed budgets. She accepted the role of RE Committee Chair as we were moving out of our old building. While we were under construction, she shepherded children across the street to and from the library and helped ferry supplies into and out of the library each Sunday. During and after construction, she offered lots of behind the scenes support to the DRE. This year, Christine could often be found in the church nursery on a Sunday morning. The needs of the nursery evolved through the year – and Christine stayed on top of the situation and ensured that the children's experience was always positive.

June 30 will mark the end of Christine's two year term as RE Committee Chair and her departure from the committee. I celebrate her faithful and cheerful service to this congregation's Religious Education program as teacher, committee member, and especially as chair during a time of remarkable transitions. I reflect upon the fact that she could never have imagined – at the time when she decided to become a part of this community – the remarkable gifts which she would give to this congregation. 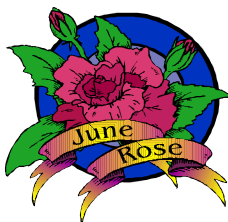

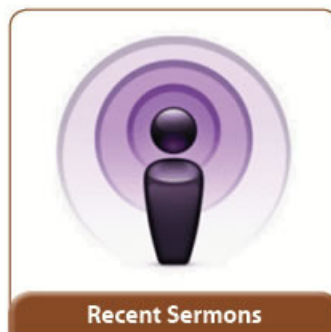
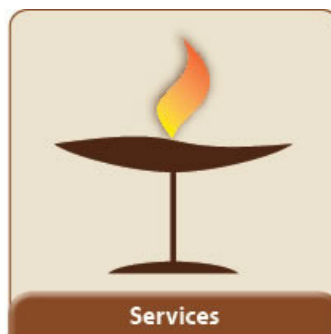
